If the apostle Paul were to pray for CBC...and for you as a believer in Christ...what would he pray? Ephesians 1:15-23 gives us a window into Paul's prayer life and also teaches us how we should pray, what we should pray for, and what we need to know and grasp onto as believers and as a church.

"If you abide in My word, you are truly My disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." —John 8:31b-32 Paul's prayer is that believers would use their spiritual eyes in order to see, embrace, and experience three great truths:

1. WE HAVE AN ASSURED IN CHRIST.

Our calling. By God's grace, we have been called out of darkness and into His light, out of death and to salvation, for His purpose (cf. Rom. 8:28-30; 1 Pet. 2:9; Eph. 4:1).

Our hope. We look to the future with confident hope (cf. Psalm 62:5-7; Rom. 5:1-5; 15:13; Heb. 10:23; 1 Pet. 1:3-9).

2. WE HAVE ABUNDANT IN CHRIST.

Our glorious riches as God's people (cf. Titus 2:14)

Our glorious riches as God's heirs (cf. Rom. 8:15-17, 31-32)

3. WE HAVE AVAILABLE IN CHRIST.

His great power has been exercised for us in Christ.

His great power works through us as the body of Christ.

What does all this mean for us today?

- I can live each day with confidence.
- I can live each day with contentment.
- I can live each day with celebration!

Strengthened with all might, according to His glorious power, for all patience and longsuffering with joy (Col. 1:11)

I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me (Phil. 4:13)

Paul is not speaking so much about what we have in Christ, but about what He has in us... He thinks of us as His inheritance. In the Old Testament, that's what Israel was called; she was called "The Lord's Portion," the Lord's inheritance. (cf. Deut 32:9) And that's what we are. We are the Lord's Portion, the Lord's Inheritance. We have an inheritance in Him and He has an inheritance in us. God glories in his saints. Isn't that something? That's amazing.
