# LISTENING TO THE WORD OF GOD

One of the great realities with which we have to deal is the Voice of God in His world. The briefest and only satisfying cosmogony is this: "He spake and it was done." The "why" of natural law is the living Voice of God immanent in His creation... This word of God is the breath of God filling the world with living potentiality. The Voice of God is the most powerful force in nature, indeed the only force in nature, for all energy is here only because the power-filled Word is being spoken. Matthew 11-12 is the **Kadesh Barnea** moment for the nation of Israel during Jesus' day. That "generation" saw the mighty works of the Messiah. They heard the message of the kingdom. They were on the doorstep of the Promised Land, so to speak. And they said, "No!" to the Spirit of God. Thus, they experienced God's judgment (12:38-45).

## THE IMPORTANCE OF LISTENING (13:18)

- The Hebrew verb, *shama*, "to hear" is used 1159x in the OT. The Greek verb, *akouo*, "to hear" is used 437x in the NT.
- Listening is foundational to all communication (Jam. 1:19), to all learning and wisdom (Prov. 1:5; 4:1; 8:33; 12:15; 23:19), and to all relationships—with God and with others (Deut. 6:4; Job 21:2).
- Listening requires...

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The parables in Matthew 13 focus on the phase of God's kingdom program that extends from the time of Israel's rejection of Jesus in His earthly ministry to the time of judgment at His second coming.

Two significant events occurred at Kadesh Barnea: 1) the Israelites' faithless refusal to possess the Promised Land (Num. 13:32-33) and 2) their opposition to Moses at not having enough water (Num. 20:2-5). These two events, marked by unbelief, grumbling, and disobedience, directly affected Moses, Aaron, and the Israelites.
