

The word translated "revealing" is **apokalupsis**, a removal of a covering—as when some wonderful statue has been completed and a veil thrown over it, people assemble for the "unveiling" of this work of art. It will be as when sky rockets are sent up on a festival night: rockets which, covered with brown paper, seem quite common and unattractive, but up they are sent into the air and then they are revealed in all colors of beauty, and the multitude waiting below shout in admiration. Now the saints are wrapped up in the common brown paper of flesh, looking outwardly like other folks. But the whole creation is waiting for their unveiling at Christ's coming, for they are connected with Christ, one with Him, and are to be glorified with Him at His coming. —William R. Newell

In Romans 6-8, Paul focuses on our sanctification in Christ our progressive transformation into the image of Christ, being set apart from the world and reflecting more of His character.

This transformation can not be accomplished in our own strength or through trying to follow the rules of the law. Instead, under the reign of grace, we know who we are in Christ, reckon it to be true, and yield our bodies to the Spirit.

The Spirit works from the inside out—regenerating us, indwelling us, leading us, changing our mindset and desires, and confirming our identity as beloved children of God.

The Spirit's path to glory takes us through times of suffering.

Our Present



For our light affliction, which is but for a moment, is working for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory. (2 Corinthians 4:17)

Paul holds that the believer must expect sufferings in this present age. There is suffering that is the direct result of our sinning and there is suffering that we endure for Christ's sake, suffering that arises directly from our Christian profession in a world that rejects Christ. But beyond that, there is suffering that arises simply because we are in this imperfect world. Paul is realistic; there is no reason to think that Christians will be free from troubles in this present life. It is important, therefore, that they learn how to bear them. -Leon Morris

Eager expectation. Greek, *apo-karadokia*, "a stretching forth of the head as an indication of an expectation of something from a certain place." (Vine)

Waits. Greek, *apekdechomai*, "an intense yearning and eager waiting with the attention being withdrawn from all else" (Wuest)
