# DISCIPLESHIP TRAINING: KNOWING WHO JESUS IS

The timing of this question in Jesus' ministry was very important. The disciples had believed Jesus was the Messiah from the beginning of their contact with Him (John 1:41, 51). However, their understanding of the Messiah then was the traditional one of their day, namely that of a political leader. The multitudes failed to understand that Jesus was much more than that. The religious leaders were becoming increasingly antagonistic. The disciples were about to receive new revelation regarding Jesus that would have costly implications for them. Therefore, it was necessary for them to confess Jesus' identity clearly and unmistakably now. This passage represents the climax of Jesus' teaching ministry. It was, in effect, the apostles' final examination, consisting of but one question, the ultimate question that every human being must face: **Who is Jesus Christ?** A person's answer is of the most monumental importance, because on it hinges his eternal destiny. It is a question that no one can escape or avoid. Every soul, as it were, will be pinned against the wall of eternity and forced to answer that question.

Jesus has taught His disciples several key truths in Matthew 14-16:

- 1. We live in an immoral world.
- 2. We face an impossible task.
- 3. We have an omnipotent Savior.
- 4. We can easily be side-tracked by popular movements.
- 5. We will encounter fear-producing storms in life.
- 6. We can walk on water if we keep our eyes on Jesus.
- 7. We must beware of the dangers of religious legalism.
- 8. We must see the absolute centrality of the heart.
- 9. We must confront our prejudices in order to love like Jesus.
- 10. We must beware of the leaven of the Pharisees & Sadducees.

Now comes the most important lesson of them all: We must know who Jesus is if we are going to follow Him in faith and obedience.

## THE HISTORICAL SETTING (16:13a)

Caesarea Philippi was twenty-five miles north of the Sea of Galilee. It was a center of Greco-Roman culture as well as pagan worship. Upon entering the city, a person would find...

- Fourteen temples to different ancient gods.
- A cave dedicated to the worship of Pan.
- A great temple built to the deity of Caesar.

#### THE UNCONQUERABLE CHURCH (16:18-20)

Peter's confession leads to the Messiah's declaration. A new community would be formed—the church—kingdom citizens living in the present age.

- is the owner, architect, builder, and foundation of the church (7:24-25; 1 Cor. 3:11; 1 Peter 2:4-10).
- \_\_\_\_\_ is the first stone in the church and the one who opens the door for the Jews, Samaritans, and Gentiles (Acts 1-15).
- \_\_\_\_\_ those who confess Jesus as their personal Savior are living stones in Christ's church (1 Peter 2:5; Ephesians 2:1-22).
- will not conquer the church (1 Cor. 15:20-28).

16:19 is expressed in the unusual syntax of future perfect passive verbs, "will have been tied up," "will have been untied." The construction is sufficiently unusual and awkward in Greek to draw attention... When Peter makes his decision it will be found to have been already made in heaven, making him not the initiator of new directions for the church, but the faithful steward of God's prior decisions. —R.
