


Lesson 8

GIFTS: SERVING IN THE BODY

Spiritual gifts are God-given abilities enabling us to serve the body of Christ in order to build it up into spiritual maturity. This means that your spiritual gifts are like your spiritual DNA—they define your unique characteristics as one born of your heavenly Father, just like your biological DNA defines who you are when you are born of your earthly father.... The fruit of the Spirit is worked out in our individual sanctification, whereas spiritual gifts are tools the Spirit uses through us to build up and sanctify the corporate body of Christ. Thus, the fruit of the Spirit is the character of the Spirit being seen in us, while spiritual gifts are ways He works through us to serve others. The distinction here is not a trivial one: Paul is telling us that character is more important than service, and that service without the character of the Spirit permeating the service is of no value (see 1 Cor. 13:1-3).
