Ezra-Nehemiah focus on three great themes:

- 1. Rebuilding the Temple (Ezra)
- 2. Rebuilding the Wall (Nehemiah 1-6)
- 3. Rebuilding the People (Nehemiah 7-13)

To rebuild the people, both Ezra and Nehemiah redirect them to the Word of God. It is the understanding of God's Word that leads them to worship, to repentance, to obedience, and to joy. In Nehemiah 9-10, the people are gathered again two days after the joyful celebration of the Feast of Tabernacles. They are both hearing the Word of God and responding to it.

Ezra and the Levites lead the people in a prayer of confession and praise to God, recounting the whole history of Israel.

God of forgiveness. Literally, "the God of forgivenesses."

Compassionate. Heb., rachum, related to the Hebrew for womb. "It expresses a deep and tender feeling of compassion, such as is aroused by the sight of weakness or suffering in those that are dear to us" (Girdlestone).

We make a sure covenant. A rare Hebrew word related to the Hebrew, aman ("Amen!"). It is basically the people giving an "Amen!" to the prayer by committing to live in obedience.
