DEALING WITH INSIDE CONFLICTS

Up to this point Nehemiah's challenges as a spiritual leader focused primarily on those outside of Judah. But before the walls were finally rebuilt, he encountered the most difficult and intense kind of problem almost every spiritual leader has to face sometime—problems within. ...As with all internal conflicts, they must be resolved—and as soon as possible. If they're not, they'll get worse. In Israel's case, if Nehemiah had not faced this problem head-on, it could have scuttled the whole building project and would have spelled victory for Israel's enemies. Worse yet, it would have brought reproach on the name of the Lord.

The task of rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem was making substantial progress. All the people were involved...and all were working hard. Even in the midst of fear, discouragement, threats, and opposition, the people remained focused on the task. But times were tough for many families working on the wall and soon Nehemiah faced perhaps his biggest challenge—mistreatment and conflict among his own people.

THE WIDE OUTCRY AMONG THE PEOPLE (5:1-5)

The work on the wall was a noble task but it stretched people to their limits, particularly the wives who were struggling to care for their children and provide food on the table. Families were forced to sell everything they had in order to survive.

THE WISE RESPONSE OF NEHEMIAH (5:6-13)

Nehemiah was focused on the wall but he did not ignore this problem. It had to be addressed. Nehemiah was also angry at the injustice but he did not respond in anger. Instead he "took ______ in his heart" and came up with the solution.

In this chapter the enemies and the city walls recede from view to reveal a more subtle problem. Here the menace is hunger and exploitation, and the structure at risk is the community itself.
