## THE HUNGER FOR GREATNESS

While Jesus was seeking to get the disciples to understand that He must go to Jerusalem to die, their minds are filled with the question, "Who is to have the highest place in the Kingdom?" With all that Christ had said and done, they were still obsessed with the desire for rank and precedence in the realm of Messiah's reign. It was in keeping with this human desire for advancement and preferment that the mother of James and John came to the Lord to ask for her two boys the two highest positions of honor. ...The fact that the other disciples were angered at James and John shows that they were in heart and in spirit no better than the two brothers. Their minds were filled with the same thing. They all had wanted the first place.

In Matthew 19, Jesus begins His journey to Jerusalem where He will be arrested, rejected, and crucified. Along the way, He instructs His disciples, preparing them for ministry in the coming church age.

## THE MISSION OF THE MESSIAH (20:17-19)

This is Jesus' third prediction of His suffering, death, and resurrection (16:21, 17:22-23; cf. Mark 10:32-34; Luke 18:31-34). In this prediction Jesus is even more clear on what will happen to Him in Jerusalem.

## THE MINDSET OF THE WORLD (20:20-24)

Right after predicting His suffering and death, Jesus is approached by the mother of James and John with a request.

Command that in Your kingdom these two sons of mine may sit one on Your right and one on Your left. (20:21; cf. 19:28).

James and John, the sons of thunder (Mk. 3:17), were eager for places of honor in the Messiah's kingdom. Their faith in the Messiah was coupled with prideful ambition. They were thinking like the world.
