# TALENTS ON LOAN FROM GOD

Readers of this parable [Matt 25:14-30] have traditionally interpreted the money as representing natural aptitudes or abilities, and so "talent" has come to be used in English in that transferred sense, which has completely eclipsed the original literal meaning. It is thus hard for the English reader to set aside the covert interpretation embodied in the very word "talent." However, the "talents" do not represent individual ability but are allocated on the basis of it. They represent not the natural gifts and aptitudes which everyone has, but the specific privileges and opportunities of the kingdom of heaven and the responsibilities they entail. The parable thus teaches that each disciple has Godgiven gifts and opportunities to be of service to their Lord, and these are not the same for everyone... The kingdom of heaven is not a "one-size-fits-all" economy. God's people are different, and he treats them differently: "much will be expected of those to whom much has been given" (Luke 12:48).

In the Olivet Discourse (Matt. 24-25), Jesus addresses two questions:

### When will the world end? And how will the world end? (24:3)

In 24:4-31, Jesus describes *how* the world will end, detailing the future tribulation, prophesied in the OT as the *time of Jacob's trouble* (Jer. 30:7), the *day of the Lord* (Joel 3:1-16), and *Daniel's 70<sup>th</sup> week* (9:27).

In 24:32-25:30, Jesus answers *when* the world will end—*no one knows except God* (24:36). Instead of setting dates, Jesus uses seven parables to teach His disciples how to live in light of His imminent return—which may be sooner than expected or later than expected.
