# LIFE AS A KINGDOM CITIZEN TODAY

We can, on the basis of this parable, divide the world into two classes—those who are genuinely born of God and those who are genuinely bogus. We can also conclude that the two classes are initially indistinguishable. Very often it is impossible to see any difference between an emerging son of God and a good of boy who belongs to the devil... But it seems to me that among all possible applications, Jesus was surely making one: Don't be a tare-upper! There's a great danger in damning others. We should rather get on with the business of helping the Son of Man sow and leave the final judgments to Him. Certainly there are occasions when we must vigorously "contend for the faith that was once for all entrusted to the saints" (Jude 3) and "refute those who oppose it" (Titus 1:9), but we should not be preoccupied with contention. And woe to us if we welcome it. How much time we've wasted and how much harm we've done because we have not ears to hear!

The common expectation of the Jewish people was that the Messiah would come, defeat Israel's enemies, and usher in God's kingdom of righteousness on earth. Jesus the Messiah did come. But instead of being received by the nation, He was rejected. This rejection was prophesied in the OT but often ignored (cf. Isaiah 53). But now, in Matthew 13, Jesus is revealing what the kingdom will look like in the interim—in the time between His first and His second comings.
