EXPERIENCING JOY!

Joy is the great note all through the Bible. We have the notion of joy that arises from good spirits or good health, but the miracle of the joy of God has nothing to do with a man's life or his circumstances or the condition he is in.

Jesus does not come to a man and say, "Cheer up"; He plants within a man the miracle of the joy of God's own nature.

...We may have the fulfillment of our ambitions, we may have love and money, yet there is the sense of something unfulfilled, something not finished, not right. A man is only joyful when he fulfills the design of God's creation of him, —Oswald Chambers and that is a joy that can never be quenched.

After rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem, it was time for the bigger challenge of rebuilding the people of Jerusalem (1:3). The people gathered together as one man in the seventh month of the year in front of the Water Gate (8:1). There they experienced refreshment, renewal, and revival.

There are seven elements of revival that you can observe in Nehemiah 8:1-18:

- 1. Unity among the people of God.
- 2. Hunger for the Word of God.
- 3. Preaching of God's Word expositionally.
- 4. A heart of worship for the greatness of God.
- 5. A heart of repentance before the holiness of God.
- 6. A heart of joy because of the grace of God.
- 7. A life of obedience motivated by the love of God.

THE PRIORITY OF SCRIPTURE

So they read distinctly from the book, in the Law of God; and they gave the sense, and helped them to understand the reading. (8:8)

For Ezra had set his heart to study the law of the Lord and to practice it, and to teach His statutes and ordinances in Israel. (Ezra 7:10)

- We are called to read and study God's Word. (Psalm 1; 19; 119; 1 Tim. 4:13; 2 Tim. 2:15; 3:14-17)
- We are changed by understanding and living God's Word. (Isaiah 55:11; Matt. 13:23; John 8:31-32; 17:17; 1 Pet. 1:22-2:2)
- We are commissioned to teach and proclaim God's Word. (Matt. 28:19-20; Acts 5:42; 17:2-3; Col. 1:28; 2 Tim. 2:2; 4:1-2)
